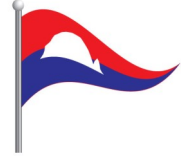

and it was nearly the smallest boat that bested all three races.

Winter only made a threatening appearance for Winter series races 2 and 3 and there was some rain that wetted the decks of the Founders Cup entries but that only happened after the boats were safely back at the dock so I'm not sure if that really counts. Eight boats entered Winter 2 which was won by John Krossa's Holder 20 "Fear Knot" over John Michener sailing his C&C 33 "Whizbang" and first time in the placings, coming in 3rd, Steve Zawalick helming "Elizbeth Marie".



Winter 3 found seven boats on the line with, you guessed it, John Krossa's little 20 footer taking the overall win ahead of second place skipper Brian Monroe in his Open 5.70 "Twinfin", which is actually a foot and some change shorter than "Fear Knot", followed closely by John Michener on "Whizbang". All three boats crossed the line within a minute of each other.

The Founders Cup race was almost a carbon copy of Winter 3, however Lynn Meissen placed her big blue 43" Alden Schooner "Guayacan" ahead of John Michener for 3rd. The two little boats again

## SOMMELIER NOTES—Rich Leamon Courtesy of Steve Autry

### Hey Steve... Ask the Winemaker

**Q. Hey Steve, Why do you put all those other flavors, like cherry, peach, and chocolate, into your wine?**

A. Well, that's one of the fascinating things about winemaking--that we don't put those flavors into the wine! We do have some control over the flavor input with the use of oak barrels and oak alternatives, such as chips or staves. The types of flavors and aromas we get from those generally are in the caramel and vanilla direction, perhaps also a little coconut or spice. But as far as all the rest of the flavors that we talk about, those all come directly from the grape. When we describe a wine, we point out the flavors and aromas in the wine that you're already familiar with from other products, so we kind of function as your tour guide, pointing out the sights along the way. The flavors and aromas that we're talking about are all little chemical combinations that create those flavors, like a little chemical called di-acetyl, which is often a byproduct of malolactic fermentation. (It's that chemical that gives butter its flavor.) Wine grapes are blessed with a countless number of little chemical fragments hidden in the skins and the juice, and those are the building blocks of the flavors that end up in the wine. So all those little chemical fragments, as well as the sugars and everything else, wind up passing through the metabolic pathways of the yeast and end up being broken down and reassembled into the flavor components you recognize in the wine. I have some control over the outcome by the choice of yeast strains that I may use, and also with temperature control (yeasts behave differently at different temperatures). And good yeast nutrition is critical to a successful outcome. There are many different kinds of grapes out there, and they all have different flavors and aromas that are inherent to the grape—a fingerprint, if you will. As long as I start with a good grape and take proper care of my fermentation process, we will be successful in creating a wine where the flavor and aroma fingerprint jumps right out at you in a way that can hardly be missed. Each person's palate is just a little different, so some people may pick up on something that others may not, but that's the fun of wine tasting—there are so many different flavor and aroma combinations, and you get to run around to different wineries and find out what toots your whistle!

**Big Rock Regatta Review** - Thanks to all the volunteers who made the Big Rock Regatta a huge success. The Championship Fleet was smaller than last year, but the growth in the Green Fleet made this the biggest Big Rock yet with 79 racers. Special thanks to Dana McClish for organizing and coordinating this wonderful event. The conditions were light, but there were no complaints about the plentiful sun and mild temperatures.

The MB Junior Yacht Club fielded seven sailors at this year's Big Rock. Six of them were in Green Fleet (three for their first regatta) and one was participating in Championship Fleet for the first time. Joel Surfleet started his Championship fleet racing career with a tenth place finish in his first race. Joel went on to finish 32nd overall and 10th in his division. Cooper Krossa led the Morro Bay sailors in green fleet finishing 7<sup>th</sup> out of 39.

**A Busy March** – March was a packed month for the Junior YC with two meeting days, the Big Rock, and the Jr. work day. The schedule for the work day included Opti bow bumpers, shed cleanup, chase boat service, and pizza for lunch.

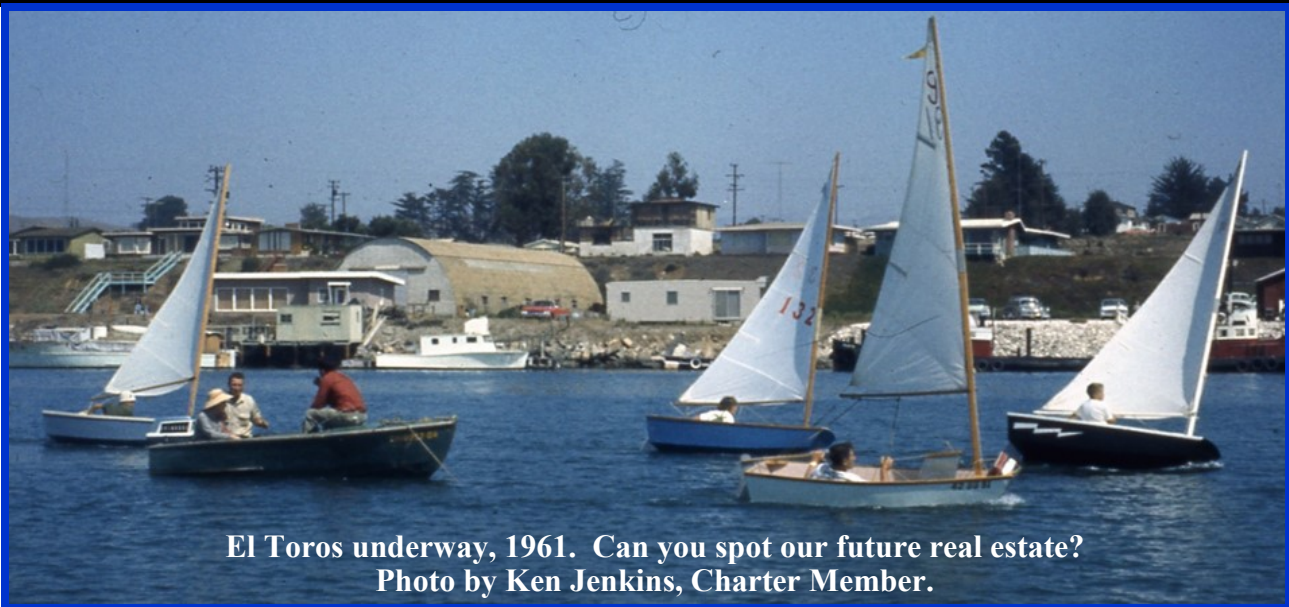


### OPENING DAY IS ALMOST HERE AND WE NEED YOUR HELP!!!

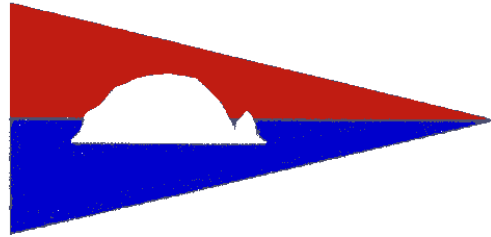
