Dot and Pat first became acquainted with the club around 1988 after Pat retired from the Jet Propulsion Lab in southern California. Retirement for Pat meant







After nearly a month's break from racing, the Bay and Ocean Fleets lined up for their respective Summer II events. The Bay Fleet returned to racing on Saturday the 25th. Eleven boats were on the line to take the starting gun for the 3 races to determine the overall for the day. The wind slowly clocked around from the South to what was hoped to be a more normal northwest direction but got stuck somewhere around the westerly direction. This naturally created a tendency for boats looking to make the start of lifetime coming in on Port tack at the pin end with boats on starboard tack close hauled sailing down the line hoping to force the port tack boats to duck or worse cause a foul. Timing and a bit of luck found the port tack boats that made "winning" starts out front and in clean air. Risk has it rewards. Patrick Gorey, sailing Super Weaner (2574), started at the front for race 1 and



stayed there. Dawn Huntsinger, Student Driver, 2nd, followed by Greg Miller, Justin Bradshaw do-

ing the driving for Dave Hensinger, and Stanley Craig in 5th. The second race saw a complete reversal in fortunes as Kevin Williams who was 6th in the first race got the winning horn for race Gorey finished 5th, Huntsinger 6th, Brad-2. shaw 2nd, Steve Borges who was 7th in race 1 was 3rd, with Greg Miller 4th. The 3rd race would decide the winners from the also-ran's and it was anyone's to win. Patrick Gorey stayed consistent with great starts and sailed away from fleet leaving everyone else to vie for 2nd. Williams sailed into second place and second overall, followed by Justin Bradshaw 3rd and 3rd overall. 4th and 5th placings for race 3 and overall went to Miller and Huntsinger respectively.

The Ocean Fleet came out the following day for a little fun out in the big ocean where things that want to eat you dwell. The Daysailers at the Dock During Summer II race was rescheduled from the previous

week due to the schooner America visiting the Club. The Ocean Fleet has been getting 5 and more boats out on Estero Bay consistently but that string was broken with only two boats to be found at the dock in morning, and racers wondering where everyone else went. There are lots of sayings about a day out sailing is better than a day ______, fill in the blank, and for the crews of Wizbang and Guayacan the saying again proved accurate. They sailed out to the Club buoy, then over to 18AB, and back down to 1A, and then back around the Club buoy, and then to the finish. The wind was consistent 12 to 15mph over the 8.82 nautical mile course. Wizbang was first to finish in 1hr 54min with Guayacan finishing in 2hr 35min. Wizbang corrected finish was 14 minutes better than Guayacan.

After last month's break the fleets won't have much time to rest. The Ocean fleet is racing Sunday August 2nd, and the Bay fleet will back on the water for Summer III, as well on August 8th. The Zongo Cup is on Friday August 14th. The Daysailer Invitational will be on Saturday August 22nd, and Sunday August 23rd.

As always, see you on the water.


